Heidi Dutton Sentenced To Life In Prison

Heidi Dutton, formerly of Eureka, was sen-tenced on Friday, June 6 in the killing of her grandparents/adopted parents, Larry and Deborah Dutton, near Dewey, Okla. in 2022 According to Bartles-

ville Radio KWON, the sentence came after Dutton opted to enter a guilty plea. The two first-degree charges sentenced her to life in prison. She was also convicted on two felony charges of desecration of a human corpse and a felony count of conspiracy.

The other three counts will run concurrently with the life sentence.

Her boyfriend, Lucas Anthony Walker was sentenced to 35 years in federal prison for his role in the 2022 murder. Walker was convicted of two counts of second-degree murder in Indian Country.

Emergency Grant From State Will Keep Meal Programs Going For Area Seniors

An emergency grant of \$100,000 from the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) will ensure that Meals On Wheels and Friendship Meals continue to be served in several area counties, including Greenwood and Elk Counties.

The South Central Kansas Area Agency on Aging (SCKAAA) had provided those meals to older residents in 10 counties through

a contract with the nonprofit subcontractor Everfull/ Aging Projects since 1974. Financial issues for Everfull had threatened to disrupt service of those meals beginning July 1. The funding will allow

SCKAAA to immediately secure alternative meal providers, cover increased food and delivery costs, and ensure there is no interruption in service for older adults who rely on daily meals for

their well-being, the organization said in a statement last Thursday, June 12.

Approximately meals were served at 22 locations in Chautauqua, Cowley, Elk, Greenwood, Harper, Kingman, McPherson, Sumner, Reno and Rice counties by Everfull.

In a letter shared by SCK-

AA, Executive Director Jodi Whitmore stated, "Ultimately, SCKAAA determined it must proceed with early termination due to Everfull's untimely utilization of funds allocated specifically for congregate meals. In addition, delinquent audits have made it impossible for SCKAAA to request a reallocation of federal and state funds under Everfull's existing agreements.

KDADS and the SCK-AAA said they will continue working together to identify sustainable service models and support partners to restore long-term stability to the region's senior nutrition program.

City Council Approved Chip Seal Project

The Eureka City Council approved a plan for the 2025 Chip Sealing Project at their regular meeting on June 9 after hearing recommendations from Director of Public Works Chris Mitchell and input from the transportation committee. The project intends to perform chip sealing, a road refurbishment process involving applying a layer of liquid asphalt followed by a

layer of aggregate rock, to a proposed number of streets in Eureka that are in need of pavement maintenance. The project may begin as early as mid-August and will use an asphalt emulsion called CRS-1HP and an aggregate rock to be purchased from Harshman Quarry, of Howard. The work is to be done by APAC Shears-Kansas.
