Medical students participate in rural medicine program in Garden City

Students from the Kansas College of Osteopathic Medicine were in Garden City this past week as part of the school's Rural Medicine Summer Immersion Program. Kasica Blick, Medical Education Hub Director for KansasCOM, said the program

is designed to get students that have just finished their first year of medical school involved in rural medicine early. "We created the program to expose them to rural medicine, meaning not just the practice of rural medicine, but the community that they might be exposed to," she said. This is the third year of the program, and each year they

bring 12 students with them, Blick said. On Monday, the participants went to Dodge City for a similar experience. During the program, the students shadow physicians, perform community service, and engage in community events, Blick said. While in Garden City, some of their other activities

included attending the Garden City Wind baseball game, dinner with the Chamber of Commerce, and lunch with the Garden City Commission, Blick said. "It's really just a big, expansive look at what rural life and rural practice would be," she said.
