He was baptized in 1948 becoming a member of Eden Mennonite Church and attending there throughout his life. He married Dorothy Ewert on December 20, 1956 and the





semi-permanent identifiers, honoring those who served in the military. Their presence is especially meaningful on Memorial Day, when the cemetery is lined with flags and filled with volunteers paying tribute.

That weekend, the cemetery is transformed. Members of American Legion Post 140 place flags at each marked grave to honor the service and sacrifice of local veterans. On Memorial Day, the Legion hosts a ceremony featuring a guest speaker and a performance by the Smoky Valley High School band, which plays several patriotic selections, including each branch's service anthem and "Amazing Grace." 
