Fools-A-Palooza. They have a theme — They had a theme about dogs (in 2024), which inspired several paintings with the subject of dogs in them."

Several of Dunkel-McKnight's paintings at the DCC feature dogs as part of the subject matter.

A few weeks after the Bowl Plaza Ballet exhibit closed at the Lucas Public Library, Dunkel-McKnight moved the display to the Deines Cultural Center in Russell.

Dunkel-McKnight said the exhibit at the DCC contains some of the series' larger-sized works, whereas the display at the Lucas Public Library had only the smaller-sized artworks — 16 inches by 20 inches, and smaller.

Dunkel-McKnight said the title for the exhibition was inspired by her thoughts last summer that the Bowl Plaza in Lucas would be a great place to stage an outdoor dance festival.

She commented, "I've studied several dances. I used to dance, myself. I am from Los Angeles originally. As a child, I studied ballet. In my 20s, I studied belly dancing, and later I studied Israeli folk dancing with a Cal-Tech dance group — They are in Pasadena — and (I studied) Greek folk dancing — That was in L.A."

Dunkel-McKnight moved from southern California to Lucas, Kan., in 1994, and she has resided in the Lucas-Luray area most of the time since then.

Her artworks at the Deines Cultural Center are mostly done in oil paints on canvas. Some of smallersized artworks are mixed media.

"The show also comments on some social and cultural topics as well," Dunkel-McKnight said. "For example Elvis Presley makes an appearance in one painting, and I also took the opportunity to roast Donald Trump in a set of acrylic and mixed media paintings."

Also, Dunkel-McKnight noted that, in *Bowl Plaza Ballet*, "several pieces were inspired by Kathy Ruth Neal. She's deceased. She was a grassroots artist, and her work is called *Wood at Play*, and it's currently featured in the new gallery at the Grassroots Art Center (in Lucas)."

That new gallery had its grand opening during this past April.

Furthermore, Dunkel-McKnight said she is still working on eight paintings which are part of *Bowl Plaza Ballet*, and she has other paintings which she would like to start. She hopes to complete this first series of *Bowl Plaza Ballet* by this fall.

She commented, "One of the paintings in the first series has inspired me to take on a second series which will be well underway by this fall, and the second series is called *Bowl Plaza-Mosaic Woman*.

Additionally, Dunkel-McKnight said, "On the north side of the Bowl Plaza bathroom (in Lucas), there is a mosaic-tile sculpture by Mri-Pilar. Mri-Pilar is a grassroots artist herself. She shares her residence between Lucas and Lindsborg, Kan. That one sculpture inspires the whole second series, *Bowl Plaza-Mosaic Woman.*"

Dunkel-McKnight, describing that sculpture created by Mri-Pilar, said, "It's a circular tile woman in blue, with ribbons of color emanating from her head."

Dunkel-McKnight said, "I expect to have one dozen to two dozen paintings in that second series, but that's only a guess, because for the first series I thought I would have 25 to 30 pieces, but I wound up with over 115 pieces — Some of them got damaged or lost, or I donated them before the Deines exhibit. So, the Deines has 103 paintings and three mural-sized textile quilts."

In total, by the fall of 2025, Dunkel-McKnight plans to have about 130 paintings completed in the *Bowl Plaza Ballet* series, including the paintings which she has donated to the Lucas

Public Library.

Dunkel McKnight said Bowl Plaza-Mosaic Woman, which is the second series of Bowl Plaza paintings, is "kind of a meditative reflection on human topics.

"The series will explore a variety of human conditions, such as strength and mischievousness.
