The Trust has provided more than \$900,000 to qualified organizations since its inception, and is accepting grant applications until Monday, May 12 at PO Box 6, Sterling, KS, or by hand delivery to the law offices of Bush, Bush and Shanelec at 229 S. Broadway.

The foundation anticipates distributing funds in June of 2025.

The trustees are also pleased to announce that the Mike Forwalder Estate has given its assets to the Moxley Charitable Trust, primarily to serve the educational needs of USD 376 and Sterling College in honor of the Forwalder/Boes family.

Forwalder, a lifelong Sterling resident, died on Jan. 23, 2025. He was a graduate of Sterling High School and Sterling College. He also proudly served in the Army National Guard. Many residents of the area are familiar with Forwalder's carpentry skills. He built and remodeled many houses in the area, following in his father, Harold's, footsteps.

The trustees wish to invite other individuals to consider gifting a part of their estates to the Moxley Charitable Trust for the benefit of qualified nonprofit organizations in Sterling.
