Drug Take Back — Team effort keeps meds off the streets

BURLINGTON — The Burlington Police Department, in partnership with the Coffey County Sheriff's Office, continues its commitment to public safety and environmental stewardship through the National Prescription Drug Take Back Program. On Wednesday, April 30, Police Officer Richard Messerly transported approximately 164 pounds of unused and expired medications -- collected from residents across the county over the past year — to Topeka for safe disposal through the Drug Enforcement Administration's (DEA) initiative.

"This program gives residents a safe and responsible way to dispose of medications they no longer need," said Chief Roney. "It's about keeping our homes safe and our water clean. We're proud to play a role in that."

The Drug Take-Back Program is a national effort designed to prevent medication misuse, accidental poisoning, and environmental contamination. It offers a secure way to dispose of prescription and non-prescription medications, including pet prescriptions and
