# **Community input sought for comprehensive plan**

COFFEY COUNTY — The Coffey County Planning Board and Board of County Commissioners have officially launched the process of developing the county's first-ever comprehensive plan-a strategic document that will guide growth and development for years to come.

To support the planning effort, the county has contracted with

Marvin Planning Consultants. Coffey County Zoning Administrator Heidi Harris is leading the initiative, in coordination with other county offices, including the economic development department.

The comprehensive plan will serve as a long-range vision and policy guide, helping the county assess current conditions, identify future needs, and establish goals and strategies for land use, infrastructure, housing, economic development, and other key priorities. Community involvement is a central component of the planning process.

Over the next year, the Coffey County Planning Board will incorporate plan-related discussions into its regular meetings,

held on the third Wednesday of each month at 7 p.m. at the Burlington Branch of the Coffey County Library, 410 Juniatta Street.

A dedicated project website has been created to provide information and host an online survey for all residents to share their thoughts and priorities.

## **County Commissioners approve** hospital request, disaster declaration

BURLINGTON — The Coffey County Commission met June 9 to address a range of issues, including budget requests, flooding concerns, infrastructure contracts, and change orders on the Law Enforcement Center project.

Commission Chairman Wayde Thomsen called the meeting to order with all commissioners

### **Hospital Budget**

Coffey Health System (CHS) leadership, including CEO Stacy Augustyn, CFO Ray Leadbetter and Chief Medical Officer Dr. John Shell, met with commissioner to further discuss the hospital and ambulance service county support requests for 2026.

CHS requested \$3,111,025 for

services, up \$83,247 from the previous year. The total increase sought is approximately \$1.1 million, which CHS leaders said is necessary to help "make the sys-tem whole" following years of budget shortfalls.

Leadbetter said the requested funds would help address projected losses, allow for modest cost-
