The pro-gram is part of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund's (VVMF) effort to recognize all who served in Vietnam, even if their names are not inscribed on the memorial wall in Washington, D.C.

of Kansas veterans accepted through the In Memory program will be displayed at the mobile Education Center when The Wall That Heals is in Emporia. There is no cost to participate, and the process requires a completed application, a DD214 form showing Vietnam service, a death certificate, and two photographs.

"This is an opportunity to proudly recognize our loved ones in our own community," said Richelle Birk, co-chair of The Wall That Heals Emporia Committee.

Honorees also receive a personal remembrance page online, a printed tribute certificate, and an invitation to the In Memory weekend in Washington, D.C., where each veteran's name is read aloud at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial site.

USD 244 BOE selects food service management company

BURLINGTON — The Burlington USD 244 Board of Education met in special session Tuesday, July 1, to select a food service management company, as well as to approve the hire of a new BHS physical education teacher.

The district requested proposals for the management of school food services and asked that the food service management company (FSMC) provide management services according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) regulations and guideline, as well as the Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE) policies and guidelines. The FSMC is registered with the Child Nutrition and Wellness

Division of the KSDE. A pre-proposal conference to review the contents of the request for proposal and to arrange inspection visits was held Monday, May 12, and proposals were due no later than 10 a.m. Monday, June 16.

The district received proposals from Southwest Foodservice Excellence, LLC (SFE) and OPAA Food Management, Inc. Proposals were evaluated by an evaluation committee on June 23. The committee rated the proposals according to the selection criterion provided by KSDE and as stated in the request for proposal document.

The board unanimously approved contracting with OPAA Food Management, Inc., for the 2025-26 school year, pending KSDE approval.

KSDE is reviewing the proposal and will provide feedback and next steps. Once guidance is received from KSDE, the district will begin negotiations with OPAA Food Management, Inc.

By a 4-0 vote, the board approved Noah Nordgren as BHS physical education teacher for the 2025-26 school year.

Four board members were present for the meeting, James Higgins and, via phone, Monique Hart, Johnny Hernandez and Selena King. Board members Lucas Allen, Ron Hess and Bob Plummer were absent. Others present included Superintendent Craig Marshall, Clerk of the Board Christy Hess and OPAA Business Development Associate Jack Koehn.
