# **Expected 'short'** council meeting lasts longer than planned Monday

Looking at the agenda prior to Monday's meeting of the Erie City Council, it looked like it could have been a rather quick meeting.

With the two previous council meetings taking about three hours to conduct the city's business, those attending Monday's session were probably hoping for an early night.

One topic, though, caused the council to spend probably more time than necessary, and it was a relatively simple task. The city accepted bids from both local banks to purchase instead of lease some equipment (a skid steer). The problem: each bid had a different term for the note – an apple and oranges situation.

Council member Jason "JT" Thompson offered the city another option, just using funds in the Equipment Fund to purchase the skid steer, but the motion failed. The city then had to choose between two notes with different terms – the shorter note with a higher interest or the longer note with a lower interest. The council went with the lower interest, longer-term note from Commercial Bank with the intention of making the current "lease payment amount" to pay off the loan much sooner.

Under Code Enforcement, Andrew Buffington reported to the council Chad and Monica Brown had properly addressed the concerns regarding inoperable vehicles on their property.

approved an ordinance to raise the city water rates from \$4 to \$6 for each 1,000 gallons for any one month.

During his report, Chief of Police Brett Ross reported the previously discussed bullet proof vest with the LaHarpe Police Department (previously worn by current Officer Stotler when he was employed at LaHarpe) was available to the city for 600 - afee Ross and the council felt was more than fair. Such vests expire every five years.

In his typed report, Ross shared his department responded to the following calls and activity: 3 animal control, 1 criminal damage, 1 criminal threat, 2 fires, 2 ATV/golf tags, 7 dog tags, and 28 VINs.

The meeting adjourned at 7:30 p.m.

Also, Monday:

• The council approved raises for each council member and the mayor. It is the first raise in more than a decade. Council members will receive \$50 per meeting with the mayor receiving a \$60 stipend.

• Approved a six-month raise for a city employee, which is standard procedure for all new fulltime employees.

• Council member Cindy Friedrich requested some work at the Dinosaur Park to fix a broken gate entrance.

• Approved the notice of public hearing for a Neighborhood Revitalization Plan for May 12, starting at 5:55 p.m. (prior to the start of the next council meeting).

After crossing the stage to receive his diploma next week, Elliott will attempt to complete his training and obtain a pilot's license.

In Elliott's final days as a high school student, he was a special guest at Erie Elementary School, visiting with the third grade STEAM students under the instruction of Mrs. Lisa Maher. Maher has been teaching the students about the science of flight. What better way to impact the students then bringing a soonto-be pilot, and a familiar face, to the classroom.

"Before his visit, Cody and I spoke about the PLTW Stability and Motion: The Science of Flight and what our lessons were focused on," Maher explained. "Cody did a great job of incorporating those elements into his presentation by asking questions and allowing the students to ask questions. He was very prepared."

#### Kansas **Free Legal** Answers **celebrates** anniversary

TOPEKA, Kansas — The Kansas Bar Association will celebrated the first anniversary of Kansas Free Legal Answers (https://kansas.freelegalanswers.org) on Law Day, May 1, 2025. This virtual legal advice clinic, hosted by the American Bar Association and funded by the Kansas Bar Foundation, allows income-eligible Kansans to submit legal questions for volunteer attorneys to answer.

Kansas is among 42 states participating in this national program.

In its first 10 months, 550 individuals submitted 564 questions across various legal topics including family law, housing, consumer rights, employment/unemployment, and civil rights. Family law issues dominated at 30% of inquiries, followed by housing concerns at 14%.

"Free Legal Answers provides a frictionless opportunity for Kansas residents to get access to legal advice," said Mitch Biebighauser, KBA Access to Justice Committee member. "Breaking down barriers between individuals and their rights is crucial to operating a society governed by the rule of law."

Law Day was selected as the launch date of Kansas Free Legal Answers in 2024 to introduce the program and to generate interest for attorneys looking for pro bono opportunities.

"The program offers attorneys flexible pro bono opportunities with a 24/7 platform and customizable time commitments," says Martha Coffman, Chair of the KBA's Access to Justice Committee. Coffman also ex-

Erie High School senior Reid Duff accomplished a lot during his prep basketball career. He helped lead the team to the Class 2A State Tournament his junior year, and during his high school career, he became the second-leading scorer in program history.

Duff will now be taking his abilities to shoot the rock to Chanute as he committed to the Neosho County Community College basketball program during ceremonies last week at the high school gymnasium.

"I want to score a lot of points as a Panther," Duff told The Record Monday, referencing his new program.

Duff has thought about playing at the next level since his freshman year, though he took his time, evaluating his different opportunities. He felt "very familiar" with the NCCC program.

"Why NCCC? That's a great question," Duff replied. "I felt like I have watched a lot of their games, and when I was little, I went to a lot of their camps. It just felt like the right choice."

Ironically, it was when Duff

struggled early in his senior campaign that NCCC made perhaps the most impression.

"My favorite part about NCCC was when I wasn't playing very well to start the season, they kept texting me, communicating with me," Duff explained. "That meant a lot."

Duff even joked that the coaching staff teased him a bit, too. After Duff went for 40 against Caney - a very good team, the NCCC coaches watched Duff's next game.

"We come to watch you and you only score six," Duff said the coaches teased him.
