## President search

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"We had a good conversation," Holt said. "I'm excited to work with Rich and the team. I think they're going to be really helpful."

Holt said one aspect of the process - which "will be different" - involves a "one-way interview," rather than interviewing applicants through Zoom, which the board did through a process to hire a new president in 2023.

That year, trustees narrowed its search to three finalists and conducted special meetings on separate dates to interview finalists for the position.

"The last go-round, we narrowed it down to a group and did Zoom interviews, and from there we picked three to bring to Fort Scott," he said. "Instead of Zoom, essentially, the applicant is doing it online. They get the question presented to them and have 30 seconds to review the question and think about their answer, then start recording. Instead of the panel and everybody

meeting with the applicant, everybody gets to see the answers. We're not asking

any follow up.' Holt said he thinks a benefit of this process will be "not coordinating as many schedules."

"It will provide some good perspective to this thing and be really beneficial," he said.

Holt said trustees also provided their thoughts on some characteristics they would like to see in the next president. He said he anticipates the Greenbush team will give a report in about a month.

"Rich thought it lined up well with the rest of the institution," he said about the characteristics. "I assume we'll get a report or update that shows we've gone through our listening sessions, compiled everything and here's what we've got.'

There was some discussion about a couple of panels that will be used for the final rounds of interviews when those candidates visit the campus. Holt said an employee panel and a community panel will provide input, but the board will make the decision on the

hiring process.

The process will take awhile to complete, Holt said, adding he expects not to hear from Proffitt for about 30 days "on this first round." Holt said the board does not want to hasten the process

"We talked about having three or four finalists to bring to campus, but that probably won't be until June," he said. "We're expecting it to take a little bit."

"The message last night is we want people to be patient. The process will take a little time," he said. "We'd rather take our time and do a good job than make a hurried decision."

Proffitt has said the process typically takes about eight to 12 weeks from the beginning to finding a candidate. He said the search process can be customized to fit the board's needs.

In 2023, the board ultimately hired Dr. Jason Kegler to replace former president Alysia Johnston, who retired. In May, the board placed Kegler on administrative leave and in October, approved a separation agreement with Kegler.
