"It's the story of people who were not from here, who made America very much their home. This was their dream; to carve out their little piece of America for themselves," he said.

Filming took place in El Dorado, Wichita, and Downs, Kansas. Spurgeon noted the physical challenges of filming during the Kansas summer:

"We filmed in June, July, and August," said Spurgeon.

"The heat was intense, but it added authenticity," he said. "It looked and felt like a true Kansas summer."

SUN Bucks 2025 delayed benefit distribution

Kansas Department for Children and Families

SUN Bucks is a permanent federal program administered by DCF to help families buy food for their eligible school-aged children during the summer.

Benefit distribution for this program was originally expected to begin in mid to late April 2025 and has been delayed. The delay is a result of two factors. While DCF received approval of its 2025 SUN Bucks program from our federal partner, the USDA Food and Nutrition Service (FNS), DCF was awaiting its award letter from FNS outlining the total benefit amount awarded to the state. DCF just received that letter.

In addition to the federal funding, DCF must also provide the Kansas legislature's finance council with proof of filing the Pop and Candy Waiver that would make some candy and soft drinks ineligible to purchase with SNAP benefits. This new requirement was included in the state budget for FY25. DCF is working with the governor's office on the most appropriate next steps.

An updated timeline has not yet been determined. Updates will be provided on the DCF website and Facebook page.
