PART I RAILROAD HISTORY WEST OF THE MISSISSIPPI

As early as 1842, some promoters of the nation's transcontinental railroad had selected a route that would cross the Mississippi between Rock City, Ilinois and Davenport, Iowa. Even though Secretary of War in the Franklin Pierce administration Jefferson Davis attempted to block construction of the Davenport - Rock Island Bridge as he favored a southern route for the transcontinental railroad, this site was chosen based upon a survey done in 1837 by Lt. Robert E. Lee as the river was narrow here and separated by Rock Island, which was once the site of an army fort. This would require a bridge over the body of water on either side of the island plus an embankment across the island. In 1850, the U.S. Congress passed an act granting public lands to railroad companies to encourage the nation's development. Congress also passed an act in August 1852 granting right-of-way for rail and plank roads on public roads. A railroad bridge company was formed by the Illinois legislature on January 17, 1853 to build, maintain and use a railroad bridge over the Mississippi River, or that portion within the jurisdiction of the State of Illinois at, or near Rock Island in such a manner as shall not materially obstruct or interfere with the free navigation of said river. The Chicago & Rock Island was originally known as the Chicago & LaSalle Railroad chartered on February 22, 1847 connecting Chicago with Rock Island on the Mississippi River between 1852 and 1854 making it the first railroad to reach that part of the river and not crossing it. Built using timber and wrought iron, construction on the Chicago & Rock Island bridge began in 1854 and when it was completed on April 22, 1856 the 1,582 ft. long structure consisted of five 250 ft. spans flanking a single 286 ft. span wooden swing.

On May 6, 1856, the Effie Afron, a 235 ft. long sternwheeler steamboat with a 37 ft. width crashed into the Rock Island bridge destroying the steamboat as well as part of the bridge. The steamboat owners decided to take the railroad companies that built the bridge to court. They wanted the railroad to pay for the damages to the Effie Afron and its cargo. They also wanted the court to declare the bridge a danger to river travel and order its removal. In Sept. 1857, the case went to court in Chicago.

The lawyers for the railroad which included a young Abraham Lincoln, argued that the bridge was not a hazard to navigation on the river if steamboat pilots were careful and that it was the Effie Afron's fault it had run into the bridge. They pointed out that for three or four months steamboats could not travel the upper Mississippi because it was frozen over or filled with ice. Trains on the other hand, could operate year round. The jury on the case voted nine to three against the bridge. The case went next to the United States Congress and congress decided the bridge was a hazard to navigation and should be removed, but left it to the courts to decide the bridge's fate. The case was finally settled in Dec. 1862 by the United States Supreme Court and the bridge was allowed to stand.

This brings Part 1 of this series to an end, and for the continuation of Part 1 follow the History Road in July 2025.
