County launches new website

Montgomery County officials announced the long-awaited launch of the refurbished county website

Monday morning. The address is just the same as the old website- mgcountyks.org- but the looks have definitely changed. A streamlined, more organized website meets visitors. The usual tabs are located up topgovernment, departments, court services, etc. Below, larger tabs include Agenda and Minutes for Commission meetings; legal notices and publications; a contact tab; livestream tab; employment opportunities within the County and a maps tab.

The most noticeable change is the move to CivicCore for the Commission section of the website. The program, already utilized by a number of local entities including the City of Independence, makes everything one would need to keep up to date with meetings; read through the agenda before, during or after the meetings; peruse through the legal publications; watch the meetings in real time or streaming at a later time and more.

Hali Smith, Montgomery County Records and Operations Specialist, did note in an email sent out Monday morning that the County Commission agenda will now be sent out through the website. If you would like to receive the agenda, you will have to subscribe, which is as easy as a click or two. Go to the County Website-Agenda and Minutes- Subscriptions, fill out the pertinent information and select which meetings you would like to be notified about. In the Minutes and Meeting portal, you can find files for past and current meetings.
