Little River City Council

The Little River City Council met in regular session Friday, June 13, at 7 am. The meeting was called to order by mayor Don Teeters. Council members present were Jason Crotinger, John Tietjens, Randy Burdick, and Barry Porter.

The minutes of the May 12 meeting were approved as presented.

Public Comments: A representative of SAM, a managed geospatial services company spoke to the council about the company's services. They are a survey company for mapping of utilities, zoning and planning for utilities. The council will consider this service.

The meeting was adjourned. The next meeting will be Wednesday, July 9 at 5:45 pm.


Renken selected for All State Baseball

History of Little River

FIRST WHEAT IN RICE COUNTY

Geo. W. Hodgson helped sow the first crop in Little River District.

The following is taken from the Hutchinson Daily Herald:

"George W. Hodgson, now 84 years old, who sowed the first wheat in Rice County, or at least in the Little River section, is still living at his home in Little

He has been invited to be a guest of honor at the Farm and Home Week picnic this week, as one of the pioneer wheat growers of this section.

Mr. Hodgson located in Rice county in 1870, taking a pre-emption claim five miles southeast of where the town of Little River stands now. The town did not exist then. In 1871 he took a homestead which he still owns there.

"I lived in a half dugout, and also a sodhouse," he remarked. "I walked and carried groceries from Lindsborg, a distance of 25 miles. There was not a woman within ten miles of us then.

"Salina was our trading point. I went to Salina and bought seed wheat and my brother and I sowed the first wheat in this part of the county in 1872." Mr. Hodgson farmed with ox teams. He says they

used buffalo chips for fuel, He hunted buffalo out on the range in 1871."

For your information:

Mr. George Washington Hodgson was grandfather to the late Irvin Hodgson. Irvin's daughter, Dr. Becky Dillon and her husband Dwight, still live in the area, as does his daughter-in-law Edith Hodgson. Thank you to the person who put this in the slot in the Monitor Journal door. It was noted on the clipping that the date of the article was unknown.
