C'ville utility customers can have average monthly payments

COFFEYVILLE — The City of Coffeyville Utility Billing Office is offering residents the opportunity to take control of their monthly bills by enrolling in the Average Monthly Payment (AMP) Plan. Enrollment is open Oct. 1-31.

This service is offered two times a year — each March and October - giving customers multiple opportunities annually to sign up.

The AMP Plan helps customers avoid seasonal fluctuations in their utility bills by spreading costs more evenly throughout the year. This

allows for easier budgeting and predictable monthly payments.

How it works:

- Your monthly payment is calculated using a 12-month rolling average of your household's utility usage.
- You will still receive your monthly bill, showing actual usage and charges.
- The program is open to residential customers who have at least 12 months of billing history at their current address and are in good standing.
